## Crosscutter killed by rolling log



#### INCIDENT

A 32-year-old crosscutter was killed when a tree rolled from the slope above into the area where he was working.

#### **CIRCUMSTANCES**

The crosscutter was busy trimming a tree on a steep slope when a tree from further up the slope rolled down and crushed him. As the crosscutter was working on his own there were no witnesses. The investigating inspector reasoned that the tree may have been cut-up and left standing, before falling and gaining momentum when it rolled over the trimmed logs.

#### **INVESTIGATION**

The investigation determined that the crosscutter was working downhill from a tree that was either precariously perched, unstable or was cut-up and still standing.

#### DEPARTMENT OF LABOUR ADVICE

Working on steep hillsides brings the added chance of log or tree movement. When branches are removed, slovens cut off, the tree headed off, or, when debris from other trees falls onto a tree there is always the danger of movement.

If the tree was left cut-up and standing, the golden rule of not moving forward within two tree-lengths of the intended direction of fall overrides everything. On steep slopes this distance may need to be increased.
